Electoral Map of Nova Scotia: The province is currently divided into 51 electoral districts that elect one Member of the Legislative Assembly (MLA) each.

The *Elections Act*: Then and Now: This year, the Nova Scotia Legislature passed Bill 59, *Elections Act*, An Act Respecting the Election of Members to the House of Assembly and Electoral Finance. The Act for the better *Regulation of Elections* (1789) reflects that voters – English-speaking male, Protestant land owners – voted by declaring the preference out loud before the county sheriff at a poll that was open for voting for six days. Some of the differences are reflected in an article in the newspaper and can be used to discuss progress and other elements of fairness that might be considered in the future.
